

The NHS App



The **NHS App** is a quick and easy way to use health services and get information.

An **app** is a computer programme for your phone or tablet.



The **NHS App** can be used by anyone aged 13 or over who is registered with an NHS GP surgery in England or the Isle of Man.



You can still contact your GP surgery in the usual ways, like by phone or going to the surgery.



If you do not have a phone or tablet, or you do not want to download the app, you can use a computer. You can find out more at: nhs.uk/nhs-app



Using the NHS App

You can use the **NHS App** to:

- Request a **repeat prescription** .

A **repeat prescription** is medicine you need to keep taking, so you have to ask for it again.



- Look at your information about your health and care, like appointment notes and letters.



- Check the results of medical tests you have had.



- Book and manage appointments.



Notifications on the NHS App

You can also get an alert on your phone when you have a new message.

These alerts are called **notifications**.



To do this, you need to turn on notifications on your phone.



You will then get a notification when you have been sent a new message from the NHS.



This could be an appointment reminder.
